English (as well as Spelling Shed)

- Think of questions to ask the children's author David Walliams. The more imaginative the better! Write the questions down. Remember to use the correct punctuation (what goes at the end of a question?)
- Write a letter to David Walliams so that you may ask him the questions you have thought about. Can you begin with an introductory paragraph about yourself? Try and remember to use paragraphs throughout your letter. We will be sending them on to him. In the past we have received letters back!
- Spelling: Play hangman with the Year 3/4 Common exceptional words address, answer, believe, build and busy.
 Reading: If possible read the first Chapter from any David Walliams book, or the first Chapter from one of your favourite books. Can you write your own version of Chapter 2 of the story, remembering to use fronted adverbials,(eg Always,Soon,Yesterday,Above the clouds,Sadly,Slowly,)
- Can you also use paragraphs and all of the other punctuation you have learnt so far?

Maths (as well as Daily TT Rockstars)

- Practise writing 3 digit numbers between 100 and 999. Write the hundreds in one colour the tens in another and the units in another. Can you tell somebody else how many hundreds, tens and ones there are in each of the numbers? Ask a grown up to give you a list of numbers, can you add 10 more/10 less to the number? Can you add 100 more/100 less to your number?
- Count forwards and backwards in fours and write out the 4 timestables. Play X4 game on 'Hit The Button'.
- Practise telling the time with an **analogue clock** (a clock with hands). Can you tell o'clock times and half past times? Can you then move on to looking at quarter past and quarter to times?
- How many minutes are there in one hour? How many seconds are there in a minute? How many hours are there in one day? How many days are there in one year? How many hours are there in one week?
- Try and tell the time during the day. Can you say what the time will be in one hour, half an hour, a quarter of an hour or three quarters of an hour?

Topic

<u>Geography</u>

In Geography we are going to learn about the seven most important divisions of the planet These are the Equator, Northern Hemisphere, Southern Hemisphere, Tropic of Capricorn, Tropic of Cancer, North Pole and South Pole. Your first challenge is to find out: What is the Equator? Can you produce a poster to explain?

<u>Science</u>

Our new Science topic this half term is Plants. Look at this picture of a plant. Can you draw the plant again and label the parts that you know? What is the job of each of the parts of the plant?
