Thank you all for your generous donations during our non-uniform day for the Red Cross, supporting the crisis in the Ukraine. I know many of you made your contribution directly on line, and we also collected £130 in school, which has been passed on. We have been very sensitive in our conversations with the children; it has not been a major focus in school, but equally has not been ignored and our approach has been to answer children's questions as simply, honestly and sensitively as we can.

Conflict of any kind can affect children and families' emotional health and wellbeing. For some children, they may already be discussing the conflict in Ukraine with friends or asking questions at home and in school, seeking reassurance and understanding. Many will also be feeling unsettled or anxious and some will be struggling to make sense of the events they are hearing about.

For supporting World Book Day...

Thank you for the fabulous photographs that you have sent in via Facebook, Seesaw, Tapestry and email. Mrs Alexander has been busy printing them out ready for our Gallery of Fantastic Reads. I had the pleasure of teaching Rowan Class on World Book Day, and I was extremely impressed by the wide range of books they had read, and the clarity of their recommendation – why it was a favourite book.

FAITH WEEK!

Last week, we all explored the theme of love across different beliefs and faiths - Christianity, Judaism, Hinduism, Buddhism, Humanism and also non-faiths, to discover

what love truly is, and why it is so important.

We explored what love means to us, as well as learning what it means to people of different faiths and non-faiths, by asking ourselves a question a day on the theme of love:

Monday - What is love? Tuesday - Who or what do I love? Wednesday - How do I show love? Thursday - Why is love important to me?

Children created maps of their hearts containing the people and things that they loved; wrote poems about what love is; wrote letters full of love to their future selves and to their families, and created 'worlds of love' artworks together. They also created love-themed windows in the upstairs classrooms for this year's 'Frome Window Wanderland'.

We all talked about how we can show love to each other and to ourselves. We also talked about how we can show love to people we don't know, using the parable of 'The Good Samaritan'. On Friday we were able to put this into practice ourselves, joining other Somerset schools, and having a non-uniform day to raise money for the Red Cross and the people of the Ukraine.

We ended the week with a Collective Worship in church, led by Janet Caudwell, during which we shared all the wonderful things we had been doing, sang 'Father, We Adore You' as a whole school and then, back at school, created our amazing heart - full of love!







THIS TERM ALREADY!

We have only been back in school two weeks, but we have already been extremely busy! As well as World Book Day and Faith Week, we have also had football coaching for reception children and Bath Rugby working with our Year 4 classes.

I have met with the House Captains, and we all agreed that we should reconvene the School Council. Classes have started holding their elections, and we will announce the new School Council next week. The children are really pleased with the new table tops that have arrived and been fitted – thank you Marc! We now need to organise some Play Buddies for each class who can make sure that all of the pieces needed for each game are outside each day.





Last week, we also managed to offer additional 'Share My Work' sessions for those parents who missed them in January due to COVID. We will be offering something similar after Easter, at the start of the Summer Term, where you will be able to come in and do something alongside your child. We have also been holding our Parent Consultation Meetings.
